

## 1327 Lay Subsidy Roll names and amounts paid

In 1327 Elmbridge and Impney are listed with Wychbold, but the manors of Clethale, Crutch and Westwood are combined with the Hampton Lovett entries. This tax was levied to defray the expenses of the newly-crowned 15-year old King Edward III in his unsuccessful campaign against the Scots, with the assessment at only one-twentieth of the value of the movable goods of each eligible person. Because a separate tax (scutage) had also been imposed on those who held knight's fees, and some of these people may also have served in the campaign, the names of Lords of Manors (who would have paid scutage or served with the king) do not appear as frequently, and/or are not assessed for such large amounts, as in the 1280 Roll. There are a number of reasons for the much lower total of tax collected in this year than the 1280 Roll, the most important of which is a succession of famines between 1312 and 1322. The document is written in English.

The amount paid was recorded in shillings (one-twentieth of a pound, abbreviated as 's') and pence (one-twelfth of a shilling, abbreviated as 'd'). A mark (*marca*) was six shillings and eight pence, one-third of a pound; and a half mark (*dim marca*) was three shillings and four pence, one-sixth of a pound. The totals for each manor are given, sometimes including amounts in pounds (abbreviated as 'li'). Roman numerals are used.

Each name was written using Latin, and we give a translation which where known includes the meaning of the surname or description of the person. L after a name in our list indicates someone who was probably the Lord of the manor (who could be a man or woman) because of their position on the list and/or the amount paid.
